Modern Visionaries: Charles Correa's Urban Paradigms



Design Odyssey-Exploring Environmental Sensitivity & Innovation



Can you share a brief overview of your journey into the field of architecture?

I became a student of architecture about 22 years back and still see myself as one. Although I have many interests, my deepest involvement has been in the field of environmental design; what people like to call sustainable design. Over the years, I have been fortunate enough to be given many opportunities to explore the seemingly unresolvable conflict between today's insatiable modernity and the more frugal & prudent traditional ways.

Could you highlight a few of your most significant design projects? What makes them stand out?

The projects that come to mind right now, are the ones that helped me clarify

my approach. For example, I was an environmental consultant for a Code for Sustainable Homes (UK) certification of a Net Zero Carbon residential project in Chiswick, London, way back in 2011. This project was very ambitious and technologically driven. A few years later, a residential bungalow refurbishment at Kalkaji (2018) turned out to be a highly experimental project that revolved around upcycling and exploring the idea of beauty & imperfection. Recently, I completed the interiors of an apartment in Jagatpura, Ahmedabad (2023) for a family based in Houston. The focus of this project was towards using decades old reclaimed valsad teak in new ways, high customization & incorporation handicrafts. I have really enjoyed being part of these projects.

Can you walk us through your typical design process from concept to completion?

I like to play with contradictions. Tradition & modernity. Affluence & frugality. It begins with talking to the client, researching, looking for inspiration, sketching, drawing, detailing, talking to the team - and the repeated, cyclic practice of the same. But there is no singular chronological sequence that is followed strictly across projects. While some steps do happen similarly, I look for a different path for each project. In any case, each project has its own set of challenges. In some cases, the needs of the context create the seed of the project. In some cases, a strong context is missing and has to be created. I would like to think of a successful project as an experimental process that ignites & sustains my curiosity and leaves me happy at the end.

What are some of the most challenging obstacles you've faced in your career, and how did you overcome them?

Every person goes through difficult times. The design industry isn't exactly the easiest place to find one's bearing in. I too have had my own set of challenges. The very first one was having to abandon our home in Kashmir in 1990 due to terrorism. And there are so many other challenges that will require a separate discussion. However, what I tell others is - If you really enjoy the everyday grind of it, only then is it worth the effort. It is important to love doing the basics everyday. In this context, my association with teaching as a visiting faculty has helped me stay inspired, become a better designer and a better person.

What current trends do you see shaping the architectural landscape in India?

India has had the history of producing the most incredible examples of architecture. In order for us to flourish the same way once again, we firstly need a better schooling system that produces people that are curious, fearless & tolerant towards uncertainty. We need to first become comfortable in our own shoes and reduce the hero worship. It is one thing to be inspired by the thinking and philosophy of the West. But we should stop expecting them to show us the direction perpetually. We should not blindly borrow solutions that are not meant for our context. We have our own unique problems and unique ways of thinking. As people, we have the





intelligence & versatility to speak multiple languages, to be totally comfortable with the future and the past, with technologies like AI as well as traditional handicrafts.

Hopefully, India will once again become an inspiration for others when it comes to Architecture. I hope to see a day when discussions around architecture become part of schools, offices & cafes across our cities.

Is there anything else you'd like to share with our readers about your journey, your projects, or the state of architecture in India?
